A profile of young people in Tipperary - July 2020

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Tipperary: Key Statistics

Introduction

The following report provides an overview of key characteristics of the Tipperary population, focusing on the youth population, aged 12-25 years, and includes *My World Survey 2* (Dooley, O'Connor, Fitzgerald, & O'Reilly, 2019) data for adolescents and young adults. It also contains directories of relevant services and supports for young people, educational settings and health services in the county.

Please note that there are areas within this report that do not reference the 12-25 year-old age group. This is due to Census data being restricted to 0-24 and 25+ age groups, in some cases.

Characteristics of the Tipperary Population

Overview of the Tipperary Population

The county of Tipperary comprises a population of 159,553 people (Central Statistics Office [CSO], 2017), the 7th highest population by county in Ireland. South Tipperary has a slightly higher population ($N=88,271$) than North Tipperary ($N=71,282$). While the population in Tipperary has increased by 7% in the ten years between Census 2006 and 2016, most of this growth occurred between 2006 and 2011, with only a 0.5% increase since 2011. Overall, Tipperary experienced a lower rate of population growth between 2006 and 2016 than the increase (12%) in the national population of Ireland during this time.

Tipperary is a largely rural county, with over half of the population (58.5%) living in rural areas. Clonmel is the largest town by population with 17,140 residents, followed by Nenagh (8,968) Thurles (7,940), and Roscrea (5,446; see Appendix A for a more detailed breakdown on population change and density by electoral division in Tipperary). The average age of the Tipperary population is 38.6 years (CSO, 2017), which is only marginally higher than the state average of 37.4. Tipperary has a relatively high proportion of young people with approximately one third (32.8%) of its






Figure 1. Age cohorts by gender across Tipperary electoral division areas.

total population under the age of 25 in 2016 ($n=52,341$), making it the 8th youngest county in the state (CSO, 2017). In 2016, 15,396 (29%) young people in Tipperary were aged between 12-18 years and 9,472 (18%) were aged between 19-24 years. The gender split in the population of young people aged 12-24 in Tipperary is roughly equal, with 12,771 males (51.4%) and 12,097 females (48.6%).

Slightly more young people (54.9%, $n = 13,653$) live in South Tipperary than those living in North Tipperary (45.1%, $n = 11,215$). Most young people aged 12-24 live in the electoral districts of Thurles Urban ($n = 1,120$), Roscrea ($n = 1,046$), Clonmel Rural ($n = 925$), Clonmel West Urban ($n = 799$), Nenagh West Urban ($n = 735$) and Carrick-on-Suir Urban (709; CSO, 2017. Please see Appendix B for Small Area Data for age and gender).

Nationality and Ethnicity

The vast majority of the Tipperary population are Irish (90%) and identify as White Irish (87.4%; CSO, 2017). Notably, the number of non-Irish Nationals living in Tipperary decreased (-7.7%) between 2011 and 2016. This reflects similar trends at national level (-1.7%), although a greater decline in non-Irish Nationals has been observed in Tipperary.

This profile of nationality is consistent in the population of young people in Tipperary; the majority are Irish (92%) and identify as White Irish (88%). Only 6.7% of young people aged 0-24 are from countries outside of Ireland, compared to 8.2% of 0-24 year olds in the whole of Ireland. The majority of non-Irish nationals aged 0-24 living in Tipperary are from one of 28 European Union (EU) countries (5.8% of the 0-24 population),




Figure 2. Ethnicity and nationality of the Tipperary 0-24 age cohort.

with the largest representation of these from Poland (38.1%) and the UK (23.2%). Only a small proportion (0.7%) of young people in Tipperary are from countries outside of Europe and the EU.

This is also reflected in statistics on ethnicity, whereby the next largest ethnic grouping for 0-24 year olds in Tipperary after White Irish is any Other White background (7%) and only 3% identify as Black/Black Irish, Asian/Asian Irish, or other including mixed ethnic background. Only 1.5% of 0-24 year olds in Tipperary identify as Irish travellers. Figure 2 below shows a breakdown of ethnicity and nationality for 0-24 year olds in county Tipperary.

Household Composition

Consistent with figures for the whole of Ireland, the vast majority of families with children in Tipperary are nuclear or two-parent families ($n=22,219$, 74%; CSO, 2017). A smaller but substantial proportion of young people ($n=7,793$, 26%) live in lone-parent families, the majority of which ($n=6,646$, 85.3%) are single parent families consisting of a mother and children. Single parent families of a father and children account for only 14.7% of lone-parent families in Tipperary (CSO, 2017). Table 1 provides an overview of household composition by family type for family units with children in Tipperary.

The 2016 Census reports that most families with children in Tipperary have either one ($n=12,138$, 40.4%) or two ($n=10,392$, 34.6%) children. A very small proportion report having five or more children ($n=585$, 1.9%). As noted previously, Tipperary has quite a young population and unsurprisingly over 40% of families with children in Tipperary are made up of a parent/parents living with children who are all under 15 years of age ($n=13,447$, 44.8%; CSO, 2017).

Homelessness figures from the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government (2019) indicate that Tipperary has a relatively low level of homelessness compared to the rest of Ireland. According to figures from

November 2019, 35 adults in Tipperary accessed official homeless emergency accommodation between 18th and 24th November 2019 (Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government, 2019). In 2018, 1,201 households were on the social housing list, a 6% decrease from 2017 (Rebranding Ireland, 2018). Homelessness data are not available at the county level for young people; however, data for the south-east region encompassing Carlow, Kilkenny, Tipperary, Waterford and Wexford, suggest that 18.5% ($n=44$) of homeless adults in the area are aged 18-24 and, on average, each homeless adult in the region has 1.5 dependents (Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government, 2019).



Tipperary also has a rate of children in care that is similar to the national average. Figures from the 2014 *State of the Nation* report (Department of Children & Youth Affairs, 2014) document 167 children and young people in care in Tipperary South Region Local Health Office (LHO) and 142 children and young people in Tipperary North Region LHO: a rate of 7 and 5 per 1,000 children and young people respectively. In comparison, the national figure is just less than 6 per 1,000 children. More recent figures from the 2016 report are not directly comparable with reports from previous years as North Tipperary is now included in the Mid-west Tusla administrative areas with Clare and Limerick (a rate of 6.3 per 1,000) and South Tipperary is now combined with Carlow and Kilkenny (a rate of 6.6 per 1,000; Department of Children & Youth Affairs, 2016).

Education and Employment

Overall, levels of education in Tipperary are below the national average: a lower proportion of those aged 15 and above in Tipperary have a third-level degree (34.8% vs 42%) and a higher proportion have no formal or primary only education (14.2% vs 13.3%; CSO, 2017).




Figure 3. Highest education level of those age 15 years and above by gender in Tipperary.

As can be seen in Figure 3, women in Tipperary typically report slightly higher levels of educational attainment than men, with more women reporting having upper secondary or third-level education and more males reporting lower secondary education or below.

With 30 post-primary schools and 4 special education schools registered with the Department of Education and Skills alongside a number of other educational settings such as Youthreach, a large

number of young people are currently in education in county Tipperary. In total, for the school year 2018/2019, 13,550 young people were enrolled in mainstream post-primary schools in the Tipperary area; 6,795 (50.1%) were female and 6,755 were male (49.9%; Department of Education and Skills, 2018). Moreover, 10.3% ($n=12,932$) of the Tipperary population aged 15 and over are reported as still in education, encompassing second and third-level settings (CSO, 2017). A full list of primary, post-primary and other educational settings in county Tipperary is on p39.

In terms of employment, national Census and *CSO Labour Force Survey* figures indicate that the number of people who are unemployed has decreased steadily since 2011 (CSO, 2017; CSO, 2019a). Figures for Tipperary follow this national trend, with a decrease in the unemployment rate from 19.9% in 2011 to 14.6% in 2016 (CSO, 2017). Consistent with this, youth unemployment has also declined since 2011. Census figures for 2016 show that the unemployment rate for 15-24 year olds in Tipperary dropped from 44.4% in 2011 to 32.5% in 2016. Recent figures from December 2019 report 7,380 people on the Live Register in Tipperary: 11.8% ($n= 870$) of these are young people aged between 15-25 (CSO, 2019b). Overall, this represents a slight reduction from the start of the year ($n=964$).

A large proportion of the Tipperary population consists of young people aged less than 15 years of age who are too young to be active in the labour force i.e. dependents (CSO, 2017). As a proportion relative to the working population, Tipperary has a youth dependency rate of 33.7%, which is the 22nd highest dependency rate in the state, and on par with the state average of 32.3%. This indicates that a slightly higher number of people are of nonworking age relative to those of working age (CSO, 2017).

A small number of young people aged 0-24 ($n=428$) in Tipperary also provide regular, unpaid, personal help for a friend or family member with a long-term illness, health problem, or disability (CSO, 2017). Tipperary has a relatively high proportion of carers relative to rest of Ireland, with the eighth highest rate (4.4%) by Census county and city classification. Young carers account for approximately 6% of carers in Tipperary. This represents a slight decrease from 2011 when 7.4% of carers in Tipperary were aged 0-24 years. While this figure is low and represents a slight reduction from the 2011 figures ($n=525$; 7.4%), some of these young carers provide up to as much as 12 hours of care each week (CSO, 2017). This is supported by data from *My World Survey 2* (Dooley, O'Connor, Fitzgerald, & O'Reilly, 2019) which found that approximately 10% of adolescents and 5% of young adults in the Tipperary sample were providing regular unpaid help for a family member.



General Health and Disability

Overall, according to 2016 Census records (CSO, 2017), the majority of people living in Tipperary report having 'good' or 'very good' general health ($n=138,441$; 86.8%). Similarly, almost all young people under the age of 25 in Tipperary report that their health is 'good' or 'very good' ($n=49,602$, 94.8%), with only 2% ($n=1,073$) reporting 'fair', 'bad' or 'very bad' general health. This was consistent across gender in Tipperary, with 94.8% of young males and young females under 25 reporting 'very good' or 'good' general health (CSO, 2017).

Most people in Tipperary live and function without the impairment of long-lasting health difficulties. However, 23,593 (14.8%) people in Tipperary indicate that they had a disability (CSO, 2017). This is slightly higher than the state average of 13.5%, and also higher than figures recorded in 2006 where 10.1% of the population in Tipperary indicated that they had a disability ($n=15,098$). Although the majority of these are aged 25 and above, approximately 1 in 6 are aged 0-24 (Disability Federation of Ireland, 2018). Census data also indicates that this cohort of people typically have poorer access to education and employment, as they have lower levels of education and higher rates of unemployment than the general population in Tipperary (CSO, 2017).

Deprivation

The Pobal HP Deprivation Index, which is calculated based on household sociodemographic indicators, provides an indication of relative affluence or disadvantage based on several socioeconomic indicators from Census data such as indicators of population change, education, employment, and household composition (Haase & Pratschke, 2017). Based on Census data from 2016, Tipperary has a HP index score of -3.39 indicating that it has marginally below average levels of affluence (Pobal, n.d.). It also suggests declining levels of affluence in Tipperary from a HP index score of -2.79 in 2011 and -2.76 in 2006. Although, based on 2016 data, the majority of electoral divisions across the county are considered marginally below average, affluence is not equally distributed across the county. Only one electoral division located in the north west of the county, Killoscully, was categorised as affluent with a HP Index score of 10.93 (Pobal, n.d.). Most of the electoral divisions categorised as disadvantaged were located in the east side of the county in the areas surrounding Littleton, Killenaule, Mullinahone and Ballingarry.



Moreover, nine of the eleven electoral divisions categorised as disadvantaged fall within the boundaries of South Tipperary. (See Appendix C for a breakdown of relative HP index scores by Census Small Area of Population).

In Ireland, approximately 1 in 6 people are classified as at-risk of poverty and 1 in 14 live in consistent poverty¹ (CSO, 2019c). Young people under the age of 18 are the

most at-risk of poverty and deprivation and are consistently identified as more likely to be living in poverty than older cohorts. Estimations based on the *2018 Survey on Income Living Conditions* (SILC) in Ireland suggest that approximately 6,481 young people under 18 in Tipperary are likely to be at risk of poverty and 3,139 are likely to be living in consistent poverty.²

Mental Health & Wellbeing

My World Survey 2 (MWS-2; Dooley et al., 2019) is the second wave of a national study of youth mental health in Ireland.

This section describes key findings from analyses prepared by the *MWS-2* research team relating to adolescents ($N=307$) in schools who identified they are from county Tipperary and young adults ($N=189$) who indicated their family home is in county Tipperary. To situate the data for the Tipperary sample within the national context, this report makes comparisons between the Tipperary *MWS-2* sample and the national *MWS-2* sample; however, it is important to note that these comparisons are for contextual purposes only and are not based on statistical inference.

Adolescents

Demographic Characteristics of Adolescent Sample

Age and Gender




Figure 4. School year breakdown for Tipperary adolescents.

Adolescents were aged 12-19 years; the majority (59%) were female and the remaining 41% identified as male. Adolescents were distributed across year groups, with the largest representation of students in 6th year (28%) followed by 5th year (18%) and 2nd year (18%; see Figure 4).

Sexual Orientation

When asked about their sexual orientation, 87% of Tipperary adolescents identified as heterosexual and 8% as lesbian, gay, bisexual, asexual or pansexual (LGBAP). Additionally, 3% of

adolescents reported they were not sure/still questioning/other and 2% indicated that they would prefer not to say. Adolescents were also asked to rate how comfortable they were with their sexuality: 89% of adolescents in Tipperary reported they are highly comfortable with

their sexuality, only slightly lower than the national sample (90%) of adolescents.

Living Situation

Approximately 40% of adolescents in Tipperary reported that they live in the countryside outside a town/city, 25% indicated they live in a town, 18% in a village, 14% on a farm, 2% in a city/suburb and 1% in other areas. Most (85%) adolescents reported feeling safe in their neighbourhood.

Religion

The most commonly reported religion amongst adolescents from county Tipperary was Roman Catholic (70%), slightly lower than the national sample (74%). Furthermore, 16% of adolescents from county Tipperary reported that they were Christian, 3% that they were Church of Ireland, 3% that they had another religion, and 8% reported they did not have a religion.

Personal Wellbeing and Lifestyle Factors

Enjoying Family Life

Approximately 66% of adolescents in Tipperary stated that they enjoyed family life, while 31% stated that they sometimes did and 2% stated that they did not.

Anger

Almost a fifth (18%) of adolescents reported that they felt angry a lot, 38%

reported they felt somewhat angry, while 44% said that they did not feel angry a lot. Males (26%) were more likely to report feeling angry than females (13%).

Schoolwork

In terms of their schoolwork, 27% of adolescents ranked themselves as being at the top of the class, 67% as being in the middle and 6% as being at the bottom. In terms of gender, males (36%) were more likely to say they were at the top of the class than females (21%).

Furthermore, 5% of adolescents in Tipperary reported that they received additional teaching support in school (i.e., resource teaching and learning support).

Days Absent

The mean number of days absent from school in the past month was 2 days, with 40% of students reporting that they had not missed any days of school in the past month, 37% were absent once or twice, 17% were absent for three to five days and 7% were absent six days or more.

Trouble with the Gardaí

In total, 15% of adolescents from county Tipperary reported that they have been in trouble with the Gardaí.

Sleep

The National Sleep Foundation in the US recommends that teenagers get 8-10 hours of sleep a night, referred to here as good sleep hygiene.



Of the Tipperary adolescents surveyed, 43% reported that they had good sleep hygiene, which is slightly lower than that reported nationally (47%). Additionally, 47% of adolescents in Tipperary reported getting 6-7 hours sleep, and 10% between 0-5 hours sleep a night.




Figure 5. Sleep hygiene for Tipperary adolescents by gender.

Similar to the national sample, females (40%) were less likely to get the recommended amount of sleep compared to their male peers (48%; see Figure 5).

Body Appearance, Physical Activity and Hobbies

In relation to body appearance, 42% adolescent sample in county Tipperary stated that they have tried to bulk up or maintain muscle mass. Males (62%) were more likely to report this than females (29%). The main method used was exercising (93%).

In terms of weight management, 68% of adolescents in Tipperary stated that they have tried to lose weight or avoid gaining weight. Females (75%) were more likely to report this than males (59%). The main methods used to lose/avoid gaining weight were exercising (77%) and eating less food, fewer calories or foods low in fat (73%).




Figure 6. Adolescents' exercise and hobbies, Tipperary and National.

The majority of adolescents in the Tipperary sample reported that they played sport regularly (74%) or participated in hobbies or volunteered at least once a week (67%). A smaller proportion (39%) reported that they regularly attended the gym in the past six months (see Figure 6).

Bullying




Figure 7. Adolescents' frequency of bullying, Tipperary and National.

Overall, 36% of adolescents in Tipperary reported that they have been bullied at some point. Of these, 51% had experienced bullying within the last 4-5 years, 17% within the last 2-3 years, 12% within the last year, 4% in the last six months, 2% in the past month, and 14% at some other time. Females in Tipperary were less likely to report experiences of bullying than females in the national MWS-2 sample (35% vs 45%; see Figure 7).

The most common forms of bullying for adolescents in Tipperary were verbal (81%) and emotional (53%), with approximately a quarter (25%) reporting physical bullying.

Similar to trends in the main MWS-2 report, the majority of those who experienced bullying reported being bullied at school (71%), with 6% bullied by text, 2% online, 5% at home, 4% by

phone, and 12% elsewhere including at after school activities and classes.

Social Media Use

In relation to social media profiles, 96% of adolescents in Tipperary reported having a social media profile or account. Of those, 99% reported having Snapchat, 80% Instagram, 65% Facebook, 30% Twitter, 15% had a Dating App and 25% used other social media sites.




Figure 8. Adolescents' time spent online, Tipperary and National.

Compared to the national sample, Tipperary adolescents reported different patterns of time spent online each day. They were more likely to spend between 1-2 hours or more than 3 hours a day online than the national sample and less likely to spend none/less than an hour or 2-3 hours online (see Figure 8). Female adolescents in Tipperary (47%) were more likely than their male peers (36%) to spend more than 3 hours online a day.

Compared to the national sample, adolescents in Tipperary were taking less precautions to protect themselves on line. In relation to profile privacy, 47% of adolescents reported having their profile on the social media site they use most often set to private, compared to 67% of the national sample. Furthermore, 22% reported having their profile set to partially private, 25% set to public and 6% did not know. In terms of how adolescents spend time online, 53% reported that they never meet people online for social interaction that they have not met in real life, compared to 63% in the national sample.

When asked about being sent mean messages, 54% of Tipperary adolescents reported they never experienced this, compared to 60% in the national sample. Of those that had experienced this, 27% reported that it happened to them once and 17% reported being sent mean messages occasionally, compared to 32% and 7% of the national sample. A small number of adolescents in Tipperary (3%) reported being sent mean messages daily. Furthermore, 71% reported that they had never experienced someone taking nasty photographs of them and posting them online.

Pornography

Senior Cycle adolescents were asked about their experiences of pornography as part of *MWS-2*. In Tipperary, approximately 40% of these adolescents

reported that they had watched pornography. Of those who watched pornography, 96% searched for a website themselves, while 4% received an email or clicked on a link and viewed pictures of sex that they did not want to see. A notable gender effect was observed, with 98% of males in Senior Cycle reporting having ever watched pornography compared to 12% of females, which reflects findings from the national sample.




Figure 9. Adolescents watching pornography in the last month, Tipperary and National.

Compared to the national sample, Senior Cycle adolescents in Tipperary were less likely to report never having watched pornography in the last month, and more likely to report watching pornography more than once a week (see Figure 9).

This pattern was also highly gendered, as most males (59%) reported watching pornography more than once a week,

whereas most females reported watching pornography 2-3 times a week (36%) or less than once over the last month (29%)

Relationships




Figure 10. Adolescents having a boyfriend/girlfriend/romantic partner, Tipperary and National.

The majority of adolescents in Tipperary (69%) reported that they did not have a boyfriend or girlfriend. A slightly higher proportion of adolescents in Tipperary (31%) reported having a boyfriend or girlfriend than adolescents in the national MWS-2 sample (24%; see Figure 10).

When asked how they spend time with their boyfriend/girlfriend, 82% of Tipperary adolescents reported that they spend time in person, 45% on social media, 37% by texting, 31% on the phone and 22% said on the internet. In addition, 85% of adolescents indicated they were satisfied or very satisfied with the relationship.

Among adolescents in Tipperary, 54% said they had never experienced a break-up, 24% reported that they had one over a

year ago and 23% had experienced one within the past year.

Sexual Behaviours

Senior Cycle adolescents were also asked about their sexual behaviours. Over half of Senior Cycle adolescents in Tipperary (55%) reported having had oral sex (compared to 49% in national sample) and 43% reported having had sex (compared to 30% in national sample).

Of those who reported having had sex, 62% were aged 15-16 years, 30% were 17+ years and 9% were 14 and under when they first had sex. In addition, 44% reported that they had had sex with one person, 25% with two people, 13% with three people, 6% with four people, 9% with 5 people and 4% with 6 or more people.

Within the past three months, of those who reported having had sex, 62% reported having one sexual partner, 6% reported having two, 6% had 3 or 4 and 27% reported that they had not had sex within the past three months.




Figure 11. Adolescents' use of contraceptive methods, Tipperary and National.

Compared to the national sample, Senior Cycle adolescents in Tipperary were less likely to report always using contraception (41% vs 55%) and more likely to report never using contraception (21% vs 11%; See Figure 11).

Top Stressors

Consistent with trends in the national data, the top three stressors for adolescents in Tipperary were school, exams and homework.

Coping with Problems

Approximately 34% of Tipperary adolescents reported that they generally coped well with problems, 57% that they sometimes coped well, and 9% that they did not cope well.

Males (45%) were more likely to state that they coped well with problems compared to females (27%).

Top Coping Strategies

Consistent with trends in the national data, the top three coping strategies for adolescents in Tipperary were music, friends, and sport/exercise.

Parent's Mental Health

Approximately 19% of Tipperary adolescents reported having at least one

parent/guardian who had a mental health problem.

In addition, approximately 7% reported that their father had a long-term alcohol/drug addiction, while 2% reported this for their mother and 3% for their guardian.

Mother and Father Criticism and Approval




Figure 12. Adolescents' mean score of parental approval by parent, Tipperary and National.

Compared to the national sample, adolescents in Tipperary reported only slightly lower levels of parental approval from both parents (see Figure 12).




Figure 13. Adolescents' mean score of parental criticism by parent, Tipperary and National.

Additionally, adolescents in Tipperary reported slightly higher levels of parental criticism than the national sample (see Figure 13).

Negative Domains

Depression and Anxiety




Figure 14. Adolescents' severity of depression, Tipperary and National.

Adolescent reports of depression and anxiety were gathered using the Depression, Anxiety and Stress Scale (DASS), and followed a similar pattern to that observed in the national sample, with the largest proportion of adolescents categorised in the normal range for depression (54%) and a smaller proportion experiencing severe (8%) or very severe (10%) levels of depression (see Figure 14).




Figure 15. Adolescents' severity of depression by gender, Tipperary.

Furthermore, males were more likely to be categorised in the normal range and females were more likely to be categorised in the mild and very severe depression range (see Figure 15).

Levels of anxiety in Tipperary adolescents also followed a similar pattern to that observed in the national sample, with the




Figure 16. Adolescents' severity of anxiety, Tipperary and National.

largest proportion of adolescents categorised in the normal range for anxiety (49%). However, nearly one in six (17%) adolescents in Tipperary were experiencing very severe levels of anxiety (see Figure 16).




Figure 17. Adolescents' severity of anxiety by gender, Tipperary.

Finally, females were more likely to report very severe levels of anxiety, whereas males were more likely to be categorised in the normal range or having mild or moderate levels of anxiety (see Figure 17).

Suicidality




Figure 18. Adolescents' suicide ideation, deliberate self-harm and suicide, Tipperary and National.

As shown in Figure 18, reports of suicide ideation and deliberate self-harm followed similar trends to those found in the national sample.

Of the adolescents in Tipperary who reported that they had deliberately hurt themselves without wanting to take their own life, 36% did so within the last year, 20% within the last six months, 20% within the last month, and 24% at some other time (typically over a year ago). Females (29%) were more likely to report deliberate self-harm than males (21%).

Those in Senior Cycle (28%) were more likely to report this than those in Junior Cycle (21%).

In relation to suicidal thoughts, 39% of Tipperary adolescents had thought about taking their own life even though they would not do it; 43% indicated that this was within the last year, 23% within the last six months, 16% within the last month, and 18% at another time.

Similar to the national trend, slightly more females (41%) reported thinking of taking their own life than males (37%). A small proportion (8%; $n=22$) of Tipperary adolescents reported that they had made a suicide attempt.

Psychotic-like Experiences

Some adolescents in the Tipperary MWS-2 sample reported experiencing psychotic-like symptoms: 17% said that they had definitely thought that people were following or spying on them at some point and 29% indicated maybe. In addition,

28% said they had definitely heard voices or sounds that no one else could hear and 22% said maybe. Furthermore, 21% had definitely seen things that other people could not see and 22% reported they might have seen things that other people have not. Males ($M=1.19$, $SD=1.08$) scored significantly higher on the psychotic-like experiences indicator than females ($M=.92$, $SD=.94$).

Alcohol Behaviour

Considerably fewer adolescents in Tipperary reported never drinking alcohol (40%) compared to the national sample (57%). Of the Tipperary adolescents that reported drinking alcohol, 19% reported doing so less than monthly, 26% monthly, 12% weekly and 4% daily. Most of the adolescents in Junior Cycle (75%) reported they never drink alcohol, compared to only 13% of the adolescents in Senior Cycle.

According to the AUDIT WHO cut-offs (Babor, Higgins-Biddle, Saunders & Monteiro, 2001), less than half of adolescents in Tipperary who drank

alcohol were categorised as having low risk drinking behaviour (42% vs 65% national). A further 44% were classified as problem drinkers, 6% as harmful/hazardous drinkers, and 8% as potentially alcohol dependent.

Compared to the national MWS-2 sample, female adolescents were less likely to be categorised as having low risk alcohol use (41% vs 68%) and more likely to be categorised as problem drinkers (51% vs. 29%). On the other hand, male adolescents in Tipperary were more likely to be categorised as having possible alcohol dependence (21% vs 4%).

Cannabis Use

Approximately 22% of adolescents in Tipperary reported that they had smoked cannabis; 28% of males compared to 18% of females. This is higher than the national sample, where 15% of adolescents reported having smoked cannabis. Across year groups in Tipperary, 34% of 6th years, 33% of 5th years, 15% of 4th years, 32% of 3rd years, 12% of 2nd years and 2% of 1st




Figure 19. Adolescents' alcohol use by gender, Tipperary and National.

years reported that they had smoked cannabis.

Gambling

The Senior Cycle adolescent group were asked questions about gambling behaviour. Similar to the national sample, 88% were categorised as non-gamblers, 7% as low-risk gamblers, 3% as moderate-risk gamblers, and 3% as problem gamblers.

Stressful Life Events

Approximately 16% of adolescents in Tipperary reported that they had not experienced any of the stressful life events listed. Similar to national trends, the most common stressful life events for adolescents were having someone close to them die (63%), observing conflict between parents (37%), moving house within Ireland (33%) and the serious illness/injury of a friend (19%). Smaller numbers of adolescents reported moving country (11%), having a home broken into (9%), experiencing violence in the home/domestic violence (8%), violence in romantic relationship (4%), and staying in a foster home/residential care (2%).

Positive Domains

Self-Esteem

Overall, adolescents in Tipperary scored above the midpoint of 25 on this measure ($M = 26.59$, $SD = 5.70$), indicating average levels of self-esteem. As shown in Figure

20, males displayed significantly higher levels of self-esteem than females.




Figure 20. Adolescents' self-esteem by gender, Tipperary and National.

Body Esteem




Figure 21. Adolescents' body esteem by gender, Tipperary and National.

Overall, adolescents in Tipperary reported broadly similar levels of body esteem to those reported in the national MWS-2 sample (see Figure 21).

Adolescents were also asked how satisfied they were with their bodies. Here, 40% of

adolescents (compared to 46% of the national sample) reported that they were satisfied/very satisfied with their body, 33% were neither satisfied nor dissatisfied, and 27% were dissatisfied/very dissatisfied.

Males (51%) were more likely to be satisfied or very satisfied with their body than females (32%). In the national sample, 57% of males were satisfied or very satisfied with their body compared to 38% of females.

Optimism




Figure 22. Adolescents' optimism by gender, Tipperary and National.

Overall, adolescents in Tipperary scored slightly above the midpoint of 12 on the optimism measure ($M=12.36$, $SD=4.76$). As Figure 22 shows, males reported significantly higher levels of optimism than females. Optimism scores for adolescents in Tipperary were broadly similar to those reported in the national MWS-2 sample.

Satisfaction with Life

Overall, similar to the national sample, adolescents scored much higher than the midpoint of 24 on the scale measuring life satisfaction ($M=30.43$, $SD=7.71$). There was no significant difference in the scores between males ($M=30.15$, $SD=8.72$) and females ($M=30.63$, $SD=6.96$).

Coping Strategies

Three fundamental coping strategies were assessed in MWS-2: problem solving, seeking social support, and avoidance coping. High scores on problem-solving and seeking social support and low scores on avoidance coping factors indicate well-adjusted coping strategies.

Problem-Solving

Adolescents in Tipperary scored just below the midpoint of 17.5 in their use of problem-solving as a means of coping ($M=16.85$, $SD=5.39$). Males ($M = 17.00$, $SD = 5.36$) and females ($M = 16.75$, $SD = 5.42$) reported similar levels of using problem-solving as a coping strategy.

Seeking Social Support




Figure 23. Adolescents' coping strategies by gender, Tipperary and National.

In relation to seeking support, adolescents scored just below the midpoint of 14 ($M=13.84$, $SD=5.08$). Females ($M = 14.52$, $SD = 5.26$) showed a greater tendency to use social support than males ($M = 12.77$, $SD = 4.62$) as shown in Figure 23.

Avoidance Based Coping

Adolescents scored below the midpoint of 21 for avoidant-based coping ($M=17.69$, $SD=6.36$). There was no significant difference between females ($M = 17.91$, $SD = 6.54$) and males ($M = 17.33$, $SD = 6.07$; see Figure 23).

Resilience

Scores for subscales of resilience were broadly similar to those observed in the national MWS-2 sample (see Table 2).

Overall, adolescents in Tipperary scored above the midpoint of 24 on the personal competence resilience subscale. Males displayed significantly higher levels of

personal competence ($M=29.96$, $SD=5.29$) than females ($M=26.68$, $SD=5.69$).

School and Peer Connectedness

Similar to the national sample, adolescents in Tipperary scored above the midpoint of 18 in terms of school connectedness ($M=19.56$, $SD=4.99$) and peer connectedness ($M=21.46$, $SD=4.14$).

Social Support




Figure 24. Adolescents' level of perceived social support, Tipperary and National.

Compared to national figures, adolescents in Tipperary reported similar levels of perceived social support from adults but slightly lower levels of perceived social support from friends (see Figure 24). Overall, adolescents scored above the midpoint of 14 in family support, in friend support and in adult support.

One Good Adult

Presence of One Good Adult®




Figure 25. Adolescents' presence of a special adult, Tipperary.

Three-quarters (75%) of adolescents in Tipperary reported that they had a special adult in their lives when in need, 11% reported neither high/low support from a special adult and 14% reported low support from a special adult (see Figure 25).

Availability of One Good Adult®

In terms of how available their special adult was in times of need, 62% of Tipperary adolescents reported that their special adult is always available to them, 20% said very regularly, 8% said regularly, 5% said sometimes and 4% reported that their special adult was irregularly available to them.

Help-Seeking

Sources of Support

Adolescents were asked how likely they would be to use a variety of sources to obtain information or support about their

mental health and wellbeing. Similar to national trends, the most commonly reported informal sources were parents (67%) and friends (58%), followed by relatives (33%) and online (23%).

Doctor/GP were the most likely source of formal support (20%), followed by teacher or guidance counsellor (13%) and phone helpline (8%). Only 13% of adolescents in county Tipperary had heard of Jigsaw, compared to the national sample where 36% of adolescents had heard of Jigsaw.

Talking about Problems




Figure 26. Adolescents talking about personal problems to family or friends, Tipperary and National.

When adolescents from Tipperary are faced with problems, 55% reported that they talk about them with someone. Overall, adolescents in Tipperary were more likely to talk to their family (54%) than their friends (38%; see Figure 26). Adolescents in Junior Cycle were more likely to talk to their family (62%) than their friends (32%). Similarly, adolescents in Senior Cycle were also slightly more likely to talk to their family (47%) about their problems than to their friends (42%).

Young Adults

Demographic Characteristics of Tipperary Young Adult Sample

Age

Young adult participants from Tipperary were aged 18-25 years ($M=20.04$, $SD=1.84$), with the majority reporting to be undergraduate third-level students (86%). With regard to gender, 30% identified as male and 70% identified as female.

Sexual Orientation

The majority (81%) of the young adult sample identified themselves as heterosexual, 6% as bisexual, 4% were not sure or were questioning their sexual orientation, 4% as gay and 3% as lesbian. A minority (<1%) of young adults in Tipperary identified themselves as asexual, 2% as pansexual and less than 1% indicated that they would prefer not to say.

Religion

With regard to religion, 58% identified as Roman Catholic, 33% identified as an atheist/no religion, 4% as a Christian, 3% Church of Ireland, and 3% reported having another religion.

Personal Wellbeing and Lifestyle Factors

Enjoying Family Life

Almost one in four (23%) young adults reported that they enjoyed family life, 72% indicated that they sometimes did, while 4% said that they did not.

Anger

Approximately 14% of young adults in Tipperary reported feeling angry a lot, in line with the national sample (nearly 16%), while 40% reported sometimes feeling angry and 46% reported not feeling angry.

Trouble with the Gardaí

The vast majority of young adults in Tipperary reported that they had not been in trouble with the Gardaí (96%). This is in line with the national MWS-2 sample (95%).

Long-term Health Difficulty/Disability

Approximately 24% of young adults from county Tipperary reported that they had a long-term health difficulty or disability (lower than the national sample, which was 30%). Of those who reported this, 71% indicated they had a mental health difficulty, 18% reported a physical health difficulty and 11% reported both a mental and physical health difficulty.



Unpaid Carers

Approximately 5% of the Tipperary young adult sample reported that they provide regular unpaid personal help for a family member with a long-term illness.

Days Absent

Overall, 42% of young adults indicated that they had not been absent from college/work at all in the past 30 days. A further 14% indicated they were absent for one day, 13% for two days and 31% for three days or more.

Sleep

The National Sleep Foundation (2015) recommends that young adults get 7-9 hours of sleep a night as part of good sleep hygiene practices (National Sleep Foundation, 2015). More than two thirds of young adults from county Tipperary (68%) reported getting the recommended amount of sleep, which was higher than the national sample (62%).

Less than 1% of young adults from county Tipperary reported getting 10 hours or more sleep per night, 6% reported getting 9 hours sleep, 25% said 8 hours, 37% said 7 hours and 23% reported getting 6 hours sleep per night. A small percentage of young adults reported getting 5 hours sleep (7%) and 2% said 4 hours.

Body Appearance, Physical Activity and Hobbies

Body Appearance

With regard to muscle building, 29% of young adults in Tipperary said they had tried to bulk up or maintain muscle mass at some point (compared to 33% in the national sample). With regard to dieting, similar to the national sample (80%), 79% had tried to lose weight or avoid gaining weight previously.

Physical Activity and Hobbies




Figure 27. Exercise and hobbies of young adults, Tipperary and National.

Overall, 39% of young adults in Tipperary reported that they had regularly attended the gym in the last six months while 25% indicated that they had regularly played sports in the last six months. In addition, 55% of young adults from county Tipperary had regularly participated in other hobbies in the last six months. These figures are consistent with those observed in the national sample of young adults, although a slightly lower proportion of young adults in Tipperary report playing sports regularly (25% vs 30%; see Figure 27).

Bullying




Figure 28. Young adults' experiences of bullying, Tipperary and National.

Similar to the national sample, 55% of young adults in Tipperary reported that they themselves had been bullied, while 84% of participants said that they had seen bullying previously (see Figure 28).

Similar to the national sample, most of the young adults in Tipperary who reported being bullied indicated that this had happened in school (74%) whereas 7% indicated this happened at home. Additionally, 5% stated they had been bullied online, 4% stated this was by text, 2% in college, 2% in the workplace and 1% by phone. Finally, 5% of participants said they had been bullied somewhere else.

Social Media Use

Similar to the national sample, nearly all of the young adults (98%) from county Tipperary had a social media account.




Figure 29. Young adults' time spent online, Tipperary and National.

On average, 32% of young adults reported that they spent more than 3 hours online a day, 33% reported 2-3 hours, 29%

reported 1-2 hours, 7% spent less than an hour/no time online a day (see Figure 29). These reports are similar to national figures for young adults, although young adults in Tipperary were less likely to spend no time/less than an hour online compared to the national sample.

Similar to the national trend, 59% said their status was private on the social media site they used most often so only their friends could see the content, while 23% said it was partially private (i.e., friends of friends can see) and 18% indicated it was public (i.e., everyone can see).

In relation to how they spend their time online, 71% of young adults reported that they never meet people online that they have not met in real life, while 26% did so occasionally and 4% said they did every day.

Just over half the participants (53%) said they had never had inappropriate photos

of them posted online, while 47% had experienced this occasionally. The majority (63%) of young adults reported never being sent mean messages, while 35% indicated this happened once a month and 2% said 2-3 times a month. Less than 1% of young adults reported that they had been sent mean messages several times a week/daily.

Pornography

Similar to the national sample (65%), over two-thirds of young adults in Tipperary (68%) had ever watched pornography on the internet. Of those, 96% searched for the site themselves and 4% received a link that they did not wish to see.




Figure 30. Young adults watching pornography in the last month, Tipperary and National.

With regard to watching pornography during the past month, 31% had watched pornography less than once or never in the last month, 30% said 2-3 times, 15% once a week and 25% more than once a week (see Figure 30).

Relationships

Similar to national figures, approximately 37% of young adults in Tipperary reported being in a romantic relationship. Over half (54%) of young adults reported having experienced a break-up of a romantic relationship, with 41% reporting that they had ended the relationship, 39% reporting their partner had ended the relationship and 20% reporting that both partners ended the relationship.

Of those who had experienced a break-up, 41% reported that the break-up was very distressing, 16% said it was distressing, 36% indicated somewhat distressing and 6% reported that the break-up was not at all distressing.

Sexual Behaviours

Just over two thirds (67%) of young adults in Tipperary reported having had sex and 73% reported having had oral sex, while 19% reported having had anal sex. Of those who reported having had sex, 31% of participants reported having sex for the first time when they were between 15-16 years and 69% said that they were 17 years or older when they first had sex. This is in contrast to the national sample where 68% were aged between 15-16 years and 24% were aged 17 years or older.

In their lifetime, 31% of participants indicated that they have had one sexual partner, 27% said two to three sexual

partners, 14% said four to five, 19% said six to ten and 10% said 11 or more.




Figure 31. Young adults' practice of safe sex, Tipperary and National.

Consistent with data from the national MWS-2 sample, of those who have had sex, the majority (69%) reported that they always used contraceptive methods, 8% reported that they never used contraceptive methods and 23% said they did so sometimes/most times (See Figure 31).

Sexual Consent

With regard to issues relating to sexual consent, 42% of young adults reported that they had been touched against their will or without their consent, which is slightly lower than the national sample (47%). Further, similar to the national sample, 20% said they had been forced or pressured to have sex.

Financial Stress

Overall, 34% of young adults in Tipperary indicated that they were often stressed by their current financial situation, and

another 16% that they were highly stressed by it. Furthermore, 49% of young adults from county Tipperary said that they were not often stressed because of their financial situation or that they were not stressed at all.

Coping with Problems

Over half of young adults (54%) indicated that they coped well with problems, 37% that they sometimes did, and 10% that they did not.

Negative Domains

Depression and Anxiety




Figure 32. Young adults' severity of depression, Tipperary and National.

Reports of severity of depression in young adults in Tipperary followed a similar pattern to that observed in the national sample, with the largest proportion of young adults in the normal range (41%) and a smaller proportion experiencing severe (11%) or very severe (12%) levels of depression (see Figure 32).




Figure 33. Young adults' severity of anxiety, Tipperary and National.

Reports of severity of anxiety in young adults in Tipperary also followed a similar pattern to that observed in the national sample, with the largest proportion categorised in the normal range for anxiety (44%) and a smaller proportion experiencing severe (11%) or very severe (18%) levels of anxiety (see Figure 33).

Suicidality




Figure 34. Young adults' self-harm and suicidal behaviours, Tipperary and National.

Reports of deliberate self-harm and suicidality also followed similar trends to those found in the national sample. However, young adults in Tipperary reported lower rates of deliberate self-harm without wanting to take their own life (27% vs 38%; see Figure 34).

Over half of the young adult sample in Tipperary (60%) had ever thought about taking their life though they 'would not do it'. Of these, 27% indicated that they had thought this within the past year, 17%

within the past six months and 27% within the last month. A further 29% reported thinking about it at some other time.

Furthermore, 27% of the sample reported that they had ever deliberately hurt themselves without wanting to take their own life. Of those, 25% reported that it happened within the last year, 18% within the past six months and 23% within the past month. A further 35% reported that they had hurt themselves without wanting to take their own life at some other time.

Almost 12% of young adults in Tipperary reported that they had ever deliberately hurt themselves wanting to take their own life. Of those, 6% reported that it happened within the last year, 24% within the last six months and 12% within the last month. A further 59% reported that they had hurt themselves wanting to take their life at some other time.

The majority of young adults (89%) reported that they had never attempted to take their life. Of the 11% who indicated that they had, 13% said it had been within the last year, 13% within the past six months and about 13% within the past month. A further 63% reported that they attempted suicide at some other time.

Alcohol Behaviour




Figure 35. Young adults' drinking behaviour, Tipperary and National.

According to the AUDIT WHO cut-offs (Babor, Higgins-Biddle, Saunders & Monteiro, 2001), 42% of young adults in Tipperary fell into the range for low risk drinking behaviour, 43% into the problem drinking range and 12% into the harmful and hazardous drinking range, while 3% were classified as having a possible alcohol dependence (see Figure 35).

Drug Use

A total of 50% of young adults in Tipperary reported that they had smoked

cannabis in their lifetime, which is only slightly lower than the national sample (53%). According to the DAST cut-off points (Skinner, 1982), 52% of young adults in Tipperary presented with no drug problems, 35% fell into the low level and 14% were in the moderate/substantial level.

Gambling

Most young adults in Tipperary (93%) identified as non-gamblers, 4% as low-risk gamblers, 1% as moderate-risk gamblers and 1% as problem gamblers.

Stressful Life Events

Approximately 65% of young adults from county Tipperary reported that someone close to them died. The next most common stressful event experienced by young adults from county Tipperary was moving house within Ireland (41%) followed by conflict between parents (37%), moving country (18%), and serious illness/injury of a friend (18%). Furthermore, 10% said that they had experienced their house being broken into, 9% had experienced violence in the home/domestic violence and 5% experienced violence in romantic relationship.

Positive Domains

Self-Esteem

Self-esteem scores for the Tipperary sample lay around the midpoint of 25

($M=26.03$, $SD=6.27$), indicating average levels of self-esteem.

Body Esteem

Overall, young adults scored below the mid-point of 20 on the body esteem scale ($M=17.84$, $SD=7.03$).

Furthermore, 26% of young adults from county Tipperary reported that they were very satisfied or satisfied with their body, 31% reported that they were neither satisfied/dissatisfied, and 43% reported that they were dissatisfied or very dissatisfied with their body.

Optimism and Satisfaction with Life.

The young adults' mean score on optimism was at the mid-point of 12 ($M=12.00$, $SD=5.34$). The young adults' mean score on satisfaction with life was slightly above the mid-point of 20 indicating average levels of life satisfaction ($M=21.50$, $SD=6.56$).

Coping Strategies

Problem Solving

In general, young adults from county Tipperary scored below the midpoint of 18 on problem-solving coping ($M=16.90$, $SD=4.68$).

Seeking Social Support

Young adults from county Tipperary also scored just below midpoint of 14 on the support-focused coping ($M=13.42$, $SD=4.99$).

Avoidance Based Coping

The mean score for young adults from county Tipperary was below the midpoint of 21 on avoidance based coping ($M=19.32$, $SD=5.92$).

Resilience

Young adults from county Tipperary scored slightly below the midpoint of 18 ($M=17.85$, $SD=4.93$) in terms of resilience.

Social Support

The average score for overall social support was 62.53 ($SD=16.21$), indicating high levels of social support among young adults. The mean scores for perceived social support from family ($M=21.16$, $SD=6.10$), friends ($M=20.14$, $SD=5.87$) and one good adult ($M=21.23$, $SD=6.83$) were all above the mid-point of 14.

Almost 71% of young adults reported that they had a special adult in their lives when in need, which is slightly lower than the national sample (76%). In addition, 18% of young adults from county Tipperary reported low support from a special adult and 12% reported neither high nor low support from a special adult.

Help-Seeking

Sources of Support

Young adults were asked how likely they would be to use a variety of sources to obtain information or support about their mental health and wellbeing. Similar to national trends, the most commonly reported informal sources were friends



(64%), parents (57%) and online (36%), followed by relatives (20%) and phone help-line (15%).

Psychologist/Counsellor/Therapist and student counselling service were the most likely sources of formal support with 45% reporting both of these. This was followed by Doctor/GP (37%), psychiatrist (25%), lecturer (13%), Jigsaw (12%) and tutor/teacher assistant (4%).

Less than half (43%) of young adults in Tipperary had heard of Jigsaw, compared to almost 50% of the national sample.

Problems

Of the Tipperary young adult sample, 28% reported few or no problems in the past

year, 27% reported problems but had not felt they needed professional help and 18% reported problems but did not seek professional help even though they felt they had needed it. Finally, 27% reported that they had problems and had sought professional help.

Talking About Problems

More than half of young adults from county Tipperary (68%) reported that they talked about their problems with someone. Additionally, 50% reported that they talked with their family when they had problems, 39% said friends and 11% said that they talked with someone else.



Closing Comments

Tipperary has the 7th highest population by county in Ireland. Although its population has increased in the last decade, much of this growth occurred between 2006 and 2011 with much lower rates of growth between 2011 and 2016. Tipperary is also a relatively young county with a substantial proportion of the population falling into the under 25 age cohort.

Census data from 2016 indicates the population in Tipperary had below national average levels of education, high levels of self-reported general health and many youths lived in 'nuclear' or two parent families. While youth and adult unemployment has decreased in Tipperary over time, the population still has moderate levels of youth unemployment and deprivation spread across many electoral districts particularly in South Tipperary with the risk of youth poverty still ever-present.

Moreover, results from *MWS-2* provide a useful insight into the mental health needs of young people in Tipperary. In general, the trends were aligned to the national picture, with high levels of depression and anxiety observed among adolescents and young adults in Tipperary. Protective factors such as perceived social support, especially from adults and family was high and the presence and availability of One Good Adult[®] was also high across both cohorts. Lifestyle factors were also broadly similar to the national sample, although there were some notable differences among the adolescent cohort in particular.

Compared to the national sample, adolescents in Tipperary were less likely to take precautions online, they also reported lower levels of social support from friends and higher levels of alcohol consumption and cannabis use, as well as higher rates of sexual behaviour and lower levels of contraception use.

Although young adults also reported higher levels of alcohol consumption than the national sample, their rates of cannabis use and reports of their sexual behaviour were in line with those of young adults in the national sample.
